

Wookey Weekly News Friday 18th September 2020



I have really enjoyed starting my day this week by greeting the children as they enter from the car park as a part of our new 'drop and go' system. The parade of happy faces has continued throughout the week, with only a very small number of children showing signs of 'second-week syndrome'.

We have moved celebration assemblies to Monday mornings and the first of these took place this week. Well done to Leo, Matthew, James, Adam, Arabella and Raf for being chosen first for their classes. It was also exciting in our assembly to share the news that Chestnut Class have been our most active class in terms of journeys to school this term so far. We will be awarding walking bus badges to the children who have been most active at the end of the month. We also shared the class totals for their daily mile activities so far - well done to Willow Class for being top of the table at the moment.

Finally, in our assembly we had the chance to practise the sign language for the song that we are going to perform at our upcoming Harvest Festival. I have added a video of this song to the children's Seesaw activities so that they can practice it at home.

Our after school sports clubs started again this week. It was lovely to see children of all ages supporting each other and working so hard in extremely hot conditions. I am not sure how many competitive fixtures will be taking place in the coming months, but I know that the children are looking forward to representing their school if they are given the opportunity.

Our older children have also had the chance to sample some of the produce from our school garden this week after they picked some superb looking parsnips. They all enjoyed the rostis that Mrs Davies cooked for them, and I can agree that they were delicious!

Lastly I need to let you about a subtle change that will be taking place in terms of our classroom organisation from Monday, which has been reflected in our updated risk assessment (available on our website). We will be keeping everything in place to ensure our class bubbles are kept separate during the school day, and our procedures for the start and end of the day will remain as they are, but in our classes we are finding it is impossible for the children to distance from each other so we will be reverting to a more traditional Wookey way of teaching and learning, rather than the formality that has been in place since September. This does not contravene the guidance from the Government and will help to make our classes seem more normal for the children.

Coronavirus in children – symptoms and testing

As we approach winter and more children are attending school and early years settings there is likely to be an increase in the number of children experiencing mild respiratory symptoms such as runny noses and colds. Children with these symptoms do not require self-isolation or testing for them or the wider family.

The three main symptoms of coronavirus in children are:

- a high temperature— this means you feel hot to touch on your chest or back (you do not need to measure your temperature)
- a new, continuous cough—this means coughing a lot for more than an hour, or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours (if you usually have a cough, it may be worse than usual)
- a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste—this means you've noticed you cannot smell or taste anything, or things smell or taste different to normal

If any child displays these symptoms then it is very important that they are asked to go home, self-isolate with their family and get a test. They cannot return until they receive a negative test. We need to ensure that we can prioritise testing for people displaying at least one of these three symptoms listed above. More information is available here:
